After being refused admittance by the Dutch Film and Television Academy because of the belief that being deaf would impede his academic success, he went on to study at the Open Studio in Amsterdam and the New York Film Academy (NYFA). He has directed the documentary, "A deaf firefighter," and created "Linszen Productions," which aims to tell stories that interest both deaf and hearing communities. Anna's Silent Struggle was

directed with Emmy Award winner Willy Lindwer. Linszen is currently working on two new projects, filming in the U.S., South America, Africa and the Middle-East.

DAVID ELLINGTON:



In the past several of years, David Ellington has various of experiences of acting in TV, Film and Theatre that earned him to fulfill his desire into filmmaking.

David co-ordinated a Vision Sign Film Festival at Watershed Media Centre, Bristol (UK) in 2003 and after the success of the festival, he has gradually developed projects working with young Deaf people to create more short films. He owns and runs his production company. VS1, formerly of 'VisionSign' productions.

BRAAM JORDAAN:



Braam Jordaan, born to a Deaf family, has achieved outstanding recognition both locally and internationally. After graduating from TAS he worked at Wicked Pixels, Refinery and Condor, where he worked on a full range of proj-

ects, many of which won prestigious awards. He is perhaps best known for his enchanting one-minute animation entitled, The Rubbish Monster, which garnered no less than eleven awards, including prestigious Seoul International Cartoon & Animation Festival, Multichoice Vuka! 2006 Awards, Kalamazoo Animation Festival and Animation Exchange Best of the Best. The Rubbish Monster has just been published in book form by Cambridge University Press, also written and illustrated by himself. He is currently working on the first animated American Sign Language dictionary for children that is being put together by the nonprofit Canadian Cultural Society of the Deaf and marble media. www.braamjordaan.com

Marceau, with the Grock and Marise Falk, and the supervision of Director Antonio De Peieri and Claudio Caramaschi, teacher and a director. He's one of the founders of "IPPOCAMPUS CIAK" with usage of Sign language, subtitles in Italian and English with short films have won awards from TIDFAF, London, Milan and Siena. Merlini is the Festival Director of his theatre company, as well as a professional drama and mime instructor where he taught at The School of Fashion IPSIA, of Parma Milan.

BARBARA CALCINATI:



Barbara Calcinati was born in Milan, Italy, in 1972. She was the only deaf child within a hearing family. Deaf since birth, Barbara speaks native Italian, English and Italian Sign Language (LIS).

Her artistic experiences began in 1998 within the dance company "Danza 98" in Milan. Then soon after, she joined with another group, the "Senza Parole" theatre company in Milan exclusively composed by deaf people where she learns the art of body mime and pantomime and where she develops her artistic skills partaking to several theatrical shows and pieces, from comic to dramatic genre, gaining awards rocognition in Italy and abroad. Barbara creates and produces several of dance pieces and was featured in Italian TV channel, Antenna 3. In 2002 "Senza Parole" company expanded to include a motion picture department and renamed it as "Ippocampus Ciak". Within the motion picture department, Barbara acted in several of short films. She even directs and writes short films for deaf people and wins an award as "Best Actress" for the short film "La Forza dell'Amore". This year, she had a lead role in "La Voce di Barbara" (Barbara's Voice) directed by a hearing director, Andrea Bossoni, premiered in Milan.

DEREK SCOTT:



Derek just finished performing the lead role on Broadway (Helen Hayes) in the production of SLAVA's SNOWSHOW www.

The Washington, DC Independent Film Festival 2004 selected his movie, "The Cellar," to debut as the first deaf film in the hearing festival. He traveled 18 countries, working as a documentary videographer for DeafNation. com narrator and founder Joel Barish on "No Barriers" programs in 2007. He is the recipient of the "Up and Coming, Washington Filmmaker" award from Washington, DC Independent Film Festival and the Deaf Rochester Film Festival for "The Making of Agamemnon" in 2009. He was selected by the Serac Adventure Films for Serac Adventure Film School to film the Teva Mountain Games in Vail, Colorado with 8 selected filmmaking students and director/instructor Michael Brown. In June 2009 our short films for National TV and Outdoor Film Festival will be released. The film shows Brown guiding the first blind person, Erik Weihenmayer, to the Everest; it is also the first HDTV camera on the Everest on May 25, 2001, historically.

Later Fletcher went solo; calling herself 'Fletch@.' She has performed on stage with Ronan Keating (her personal pop idol) from Boyzone at the Wembley Arena, signing to 'When You Say Nothing At All.' Fletcher's love of SignSong has both empowered her and allowed her to bring about more Deaf awareness within society. As well as leading SignSong workshops Fletcher runs a Deaf & hearing Youth theatre that act and perform SignSong. Fletcher's goal is to teach famous people how to sign their songs. She also aims at inspiring hearing people to learn sign language, and show them all that Deaf people CAN do everything except hear. Fletcher's efforts in Deaf awareness are allowing Deaf people to have access to music like never before.

RON DANS:

ASL Coordinator for "Beautiful" Professor/ Consultant/Chairperson Ronald Dans serves as the Board Director for Deaf Performing Artist Network (D-PAN), a nonprofit organization that focuses on making music and music culture accessible to Deaf/HOH communities in Michigan and across the World Wide Web. Having involvements in a variety of organizations in two countries, Ron has worked as Public/Media relation and committee member of Ontarians with Disabilities Act, and served as a Provincial Board Director for the Canadian Hearing Society. Ron has also been a Deaf Interpreter for Ontario Interpreting Services for 10 years. In Michigan he has developed and implemented the Interpreter Training Program for Baker College and Oakland Community College, as well as for eight years served as Adjunct Professor. He received his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration at Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C. and obtained his evaluation and training from the Canadian Cultural Society of the Deaf. Throughout his career, Mr. Dans has been awarded accolades and recognition for his 17 years of commitment to serving to Deaf community.

ADREAN MANGIARDI:



28 year-old Adrean was born in Indiana and raised in Allentown, Pennsylvania to a supportive hearing family. He became deaf at one years-old, after a high fever developed into chicken

pox ultimately sizzling both of his cochlea. Raised wearing hearing aids in order to communicate orally, by 24, he received a second cochlear implant, which had a profound effect on his hearing, contributing to a new ability to localize and differentiate sounds previously inaccessible. Adrean attended the Film and Animation program at the Rochester Institute of Technology in Rochester, NY, where his 2003 film Paper Airplane, an experimental/documentary garnered recognition. In 2005, he won the Deaf Rochester Film Festival Student Honorable Mention Award; subsequently Larry Hott of Hott Productions offered Adrean an opportunity to produce a short for Hott's PBS affiliated production, released in 2007. Award-winning, Equilibrium, was based on his experience with bilateral cochlear implants. In 2006, his senior thesis film, The Calabrian's Feast, won the School of Film and Animation Department Chair's Award at RIT. He is currently completing the Master of Fine Arts program at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago.
